Spring is here! We made it through another winter and we didn't run out of salt. Look for our Road Department crews to begin ditching and paving work. We have scheduled our Spring Cleanup for June 9 through June 13. This is the

time to get rid of all those unwanted household items. This year, we've added electronics to the list of items we can accept. Please keep in mind that we can't take these items during our year-round Yard Waste Collection program. That's just for grass clippings, leaves, shrubs, tree limbs, and stumps. We also have a year-round Recycle program where township residents can dispose of newspapers, magazines, junk mail, cardboard, glass bottles, some plastics, and cans. We cannot accept business waste, plastic bags, or treated lumber at our Recycle Center.

Our Uniontown Police Department is in training for a Special Response Team. Your Township Trustees and Fiscal Officer have donated a fullyequipped van for the Team to use as a command center. The Team will be available for emergencies anywhere in Lake Township.

pools exceeding forty-eight inches in depth and having one hundred square feet or more of surface area require a permit.

APPLICATIONS FOR BOARD OF ZONING APPEALS

Lake Township is accepting applications for a position on the Board of Zoning Appeals for a five-year term beginning November 9, 2009. Residents of the unincorporated area of Lake Township who are interested in service on this Board may pick up an application at the Township office during business hours (Monday through Friday, 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM).

Candidates must be able to attend at least one meeting per month.

The purpose of the Board of Zoning Appeals is to hear appeals of decisions of the Zoning Administrator, requests for variances, and requests for conditional use permits. Members are paid \$35.00 per meeting.

HELP PROTECT OUR LOCAL WATER

• Stormwater runoff is precipitation from rain or snowmelt that flows over the ground. As it flows, it can pick up debris, chemicals, dirt, and other pollutants, and deposit them into a storm sewer system or waterbody. Anything that enters a storm sewer is discharged untreated into the waterbodies we use for swimming, fishing, and providing drinking water. We cannot afford to pollute and contaminate it.

• Use pesticides sparingly. Fertilize only as needed, using natural, organic, or other slow-release fertilizers. Reduce stormwater runoff by directing downspouts and gutters to drain onto the lawn, plant beds, etc. Use mulch, bricks, gravel, or other porous surfaces on driveways and walkways to decrease erosion. Go to a carwash or wash your car in the grass. Don't wash dirt and cleaners down the driveway into the storm drain.

• Recycle used motor oil. AutoZone and Valvoline accept used oil. Never dump oil or antifreeze down storm drains which flow into creeks and rivers.

• Dispose of any hazardous home chemicals at approved household hazardous waste collections. Use the least toxic products available in your home and garden.

• Properly dispose of leaves and grass clippings. Start a compost pile or use the Township Yard Waste Program. Never use streams, creeks, or gutters to dispose of yard waste.

• Sweep the dirt and debris from your driveway and walkways back into the yard. Pick up pet waste and dispose of it in the toilet or trash. Hosing dirt and pet waste into storm drains sends it directly to the creeks and rivers.

• Choose water-based paints like latex. Paint thinner can be reused and recycled. Do not pour any paint or toxic material down the drain.

• Maintain your septic system. Have it pumped at least every three years. Repair or replace malfunctioning septic systems. Do not flush grease and personal hygiene products down the toilet or drain.

Recycle all acceptable materials and use your garbage can for all other trash. Don't litter. It will eventually be washed to our creeks and rivers and pollute them.

Yard waste is accepted daily at a dropoff site behind the Recycle Center at 1505 Midway St., next to the Township Service Garage. It's open from dawn to dusk, seven days a week. This is a yearround collection program. Residents may drop off grass clippings, leaves, shrubs, tree limbs, and stumps.

We cannot accept business waste, plastic bags, or treated lumber. If you bring your leaves in plastic bags, please be prepared to empty the bags and take them away with you.

PARKS IN LAKE TOWNSHIP



Now that spring is here, everyone is looking forward to summertime. Did you know? Lake Township operates the Lake Township Community Park, located behind the Lake High School Stadium. The Park has a half-mile walking trail, for use by walkers and joggers only. (No bicycles or skaters, please!) The park also has a tot lot, picnic tables and restrooms. The park closes every day at dusk. The Uniontown Police Department patrols our Park.

Residents enjoy other community parks, private parks and recreation areas in the township. Quail Hollow State Park, located in the northeast section of our Township, is devoted to the recreational study and appreciation of Ohio's cultural and natural history. It is administered by the Ohio

Department of Natural Resources. Quail Hollow has trails ideal for hiking, jogging, and cross-county skiing, including several interpretive nature trails for exploring the park's unique natural habitats. The Uniontown Lions Club operates the Uniontown Community Park, occupying twenty-five wooded acres at the end of Apollo St., off Cleveland Ave. in Uniontown. The park has a playground, an outdoor gazebo, an open picnic shelter seating 36, outdoor picnic areas, horseshoe pits, a volleyball court, and a fishing pond. The newest addition to the park is the Veterans Memorial, added in 2005. A one-half mile walking path is in progress. Their Community Center, seating 250 people, is a favorite place for wedding receptions, dances, parties, and meetings. Reservations may be made with the Lions Club (330.699.1290).

The Greentown Community Park, supported by the Greentown Civic Association, is located northwest of the Greentown Square. The park has a playground, basketball courts, baseball fields, tennis court and a horseshoe pit. A building is also available for public use.

The Stark County Park District operates the David Fichtner Outdoor Education Center on Market Ave. north of State Rt. 619. This 13-acre education facility includes wooded hiking trails, a fishing pond, a waterfowl viewing blind, and a wetland with a boardwalk. Butterfly watchers enjoy a gently rolling trail that is home to 19 species of butterflies including monarchs, viceroys, tiger swallowtails, and red admirals. Song birds, waterfowl, rabbits, fox, and white-tailed deer can be seen near the wetlands and adjoining woodlands. Clearwater Park, located on State Rt. 619 at Hoover Ave., is a private recreational park that has a swimming pool, basketball courts, campgrounds, game room,

picnic areas and a pavilion available for rental.

The Village of Hartville operates Memorial Park, on Lincoln St. across the street from the elementary school complex. There is a children's playground and a half-mile walking path. The park closes at dusk. Reservations for the picnic pavilions may be made with the Village office (330.877.9222). There are two public golf courses in Lake Township. Both are privately owned. The 18-hole Seven Hills Golf Course is located on William Penn Ave. east of Hartville, and the 9-hole Lakeview Golf Course is

on East Maple St. in Hartville.

Fire Safety in The Home

In this newsletter I will talk briefly about fire safety in the home. The three areas that this article will touch upon are smoke and carbon monoxide detectors in the home, fire extinguishers in the home, and Exit Drills In The Home (EDITH).

Your home should have working smoke detectors on every level. Carbon monoxide detectors should be installed in utility rooms containing gas-fired appliances, and in hallways leading to bedrooms. Smoke and carbon monoxide detectors will alert your family to the presence of these two killers well before they reach deadly levels. This early warning will give your family time to exit the home.

Every home should have at least one fire extinguisher. Generally, speaking, a fire extinguisher with a rating of 2-A:10-B:C will be sufficient for home use. Access to a fire extinguisher, along with familiarity with its operation, will give your family the opportunity to extinguish a fire in your home before it gets out of control.

Finally, please develop and practice Exit Drills (EDITH) for your family. Practicing EDITH drills with your family will give everyone the knowledge of what to do in the event of a detector activation or fire in your home.
